I also remember him chasing me down and dragging me in. As strong as Gary was, there was no point in trying to fight back. I ended up with mud in every nook and cranny of my body.

Cumberland College

In 1983 Gary was my roommate for a semester in a building we fondly referred to as May Fall (Mahan) Hall. I was returning for a year to finish my degree and commuted back home every week to my wife.

We were on an upper floor that was boiler heated and if you got up late to take a shower, you had no hot water. Our room was rather small and we had to sleep on bunk beds, Gary on top. He would take his glass eye out at night, lean down over the bunk and yell, “hey Richard”!

Needless to say, it would scare the crap out of me.

The following semester after I returned, Gary and I both had to get out of May Fall Hall. We ended up in different rooms in NorthWest Hall and Gary roomed with some guys from Sunesis (more info later).

Pranks would happen often and everyone was a target.

Gary and his roommates thought they were clever by securing the screens on their windows with screws. The flaw to the plan was the screws were driven in on the outside. One day during chapel (think we had chapel on different days), a friend of mine and I pranked their room.

Someone that worked at a bank collected a bag full of rubber-bands and thought it was something a church (Franklin Street) could put to

good use.

The church couldn't use a bag of rubber-bands in a hundred years, but I could. We took all the screws off one of the windows, climbed in and proceeded to put rubber-bands in everything. (shampoo, guitar case, clothes, beds, books, shoes and anything else we could find)

Gary comes back from Chapel and calls me right away.

The conversation went like this.

Gary: Richard, you're not going to believe what happened?

Me: What?

Gary: Someone broke into our room.

Me: No way!

Gary: And guess what?

Me: What?

Gary: They put rubber-bands everywhere.

Me: No way!

Gary: You've got to come and see this.

Of course this was more than I could have hoped for.

However, for a split second, I thought Gary might be onto me and only wanted to make me pay. That feeling quickly passed, because I couldn't resist returning to the scene of the crime.

When I went down there and as Gary kept finding the hidden rubber-bands, he kept saying "I can't believe this".

It took all I had in me not to bust out laughing.

Gary and others told me later, they kept finding rubber-bands months, maybe even years later.

They eventually did find out and one of them let the air out of my tires after the vehicle was packed up with stuff to return home.

Gary also played in a group called Sunesis for which he earned a scholarship to pay for his college.

They would travel over the weekends to churches and events promoting the college and sharing the gospel message.

I would say that Gary could play anything that had a string (steel

guitar, acoustic, electric, bass, fiddle, banjo), along with other instruments.

Found out later seeing him perform at a local venue that he also had a good singing voice.
